
Highlights

Tweet In 2017, 650 thousand first-time asylum seekers applied for international protection in the Member States of the EU.

Tweet 538 000 asylum seekers were granted protection status in the Member States of the EU in 2017.

Tweet In 2017, nearly half (46 %) of EU first instance asylum decisions resulted in positive outcomes.

It is granted to a person who is unable to seek protection in his/her country of citizenship and/or residence, in particular for fear of being persecuted for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular social group, or political opinion.
